Last day for entering is **Tuesday Sep 6**. We will not accept any entries after that date as we require time to prepare for judging. **NO EXCEPTIONS!**

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR ALL EXHIBITORS

Additional and/or exception to the general rules and regulations may precede each section list. West Niagara Agricultural Society, operator of the West Niagara Fair, is hereby referred to as “the Society” in the following.

EXHIBITOR'S FEES – 2022 - \$10 ADULT / \$5 JUNIOR FAIR

- All Exhibitors (including livestock shows) must pay a yearly Exhibitor Fee or an annual Membership Fee as per the current year fee schedule. A Junior Exhibitor is entitled to enter Junior Fair Section only. A Junior Exhibitor must be 16 years of age and under as of September 1 of the current year. There is no fee for groups entering into the Seniors' Groups Section.
- All Exhibitors are entitled to one (1) free admission to the Fair.

MAKING ENTRIES

- Entries must be registered either online or in person (using Official Entry Form) in accordance with instructions given.
- Any Exhibitor exhibiting stock, produce or other articles which are not their own property or of their own manufacture shall be disqualified from that Section.
- An Exhibitor is entitled to enter as many exhibits as desired, but only one entry per class, unless otherwise specified.
- In Sections other than Livestock, each entry must have an Entry tag attached. Entry tags are printed by Fair office staff after Exhibitor registration has been received and must be picked up by the Exhibitor prior to bringing in exhibits for judging.
- All Entries into Homecraft, Junior Fair, Fruits & Vegetables, and Hays & Grains Sections must be received on the Wednesday before Fair. (See Fair Office Schedule). Judging will take place the next day.
- All Livestock entries are to be made according to the rules preceding each specific section list.
- All entries must be picked up on the Sunday of Fair starting **at 5:00pm** at which time there will be no Gates admission charged. Exhibitors must present Claim Card given to them when they registered.

ENTRY FEES

- An Entry Fee will be deducted from prize winnings as stated in the Additional Rules for each Section. In certain classes where an entry fee has already been paid, no further deductions will be made.

PAYMENT OF PRIZE MONEY

- 'All Exhibitors with the exception of Junior Fair and 4-H club members, winning a total of \$15.00 or more in prize money will have the following year's Exhibitor Fee retained from this year's winnings.
- Prize money (with the exception of Junior Fair) will be paid by cheque and mailed within 60 days after the close of the Fair.
- Junior Fair prize money will be paid out in cash on the Sunday of Fair after 5 pm, when picking up entries.
- In the case of bad weather or unfavourable circumstances, the Society will pay only such portion of the prizes as can be paid from excess of actual income over expenditure.

JUDGING

- No Exhibitor shall interfere with the Judges, Committee members or judging process in any way. Nor shall any Exhibitor permit any agent of anyone working on his behalf to show disrespect to any Judge. The decision of the Judge shall be final in all cases, except where fraud, misrepresentation or collusion is proven. In such cases, the Executive Committee of the Society shall make the final decision.

- The Judges are requested not to award prizes to animals or articles that they consider unworthy. Each Committee is authorized to instruct the Judges to this effect. It is the intention of the Society to give no distinction or premium of any kind to an exhibit that does not deserve such award.
- Should there be only one Exhibitor in a Class, the Judge may use their own discretion as to awarding a prize but shall in no case award unless they consider the exhibit worthy.

VIOLATION OF RULES

- Any Exhibitor who violates any of the preceding and following rules, or any rules printed in any of the Sections of the Prize List shall be liable, upon the decision of the Executive Committee of the Society to the forfeiture of any or all prizes, prize money and awards which may have been awarded to the Exhibitor as well as any entry fees that may have been paid, whether for any entry shown before or after such violation, and such Exhibitor may be barred from showing at the West Niagara Fair for such period as the Executive Committee of the Society may determine.

LIABILITY

- All exhibits shall be under the control and direction of the Society but solely at the risk of the Exhibitor. The Society will not be responsible for damage, injury, loss or theft of any exhibit, regardless of the cause of such damage, injury, loss or theft. Each Exhibitor shall indemnify the Society against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto.

PROTESTS

- Any Exhibitor lodging a protest must make it in writing. This protest must be received by Fair office staff before 6:00 pm on the date in which the entry concerned was shown, or no later than the last day of the Fair. It must be accompanied by a deposit of \$50.00 which will be forfeited to the Society, if the said protest is not sustained.

ERRORS

- **The Society will not be responsible for any errors, printing or otherwise in the Prize List.**

PRIVACY POLICY

- Any information collected by the Society regarding Members, Exhibitors, commercial exhibitors, sponsors, Directors or any other persons related directly to the business of the Society and the West Niagara Fair, will be used solely for the purposes of promotion of the Society and the West Niagara Fair, and for the maintenance of their files and data base. Any Member, Exhibitor, commercial exhibitor, sponsor or Director realizes that, when they agree to participate in the business of the Society and the West Niagara Fair, their names may be published for these reasons only. None of this information whatsoever will be sold or transferred to any outside party for any other reason.

GRAINS & HAY, VEGETABLES & FRUIT

Additional rules:

1. Entry fee: 10% of prize money unless otherwise stated.
2. Plastic bags will be provided by the West Niagara Fair for small grains, soybeans, grass seed, silage, potato pyramids and vegetable collection displays.
3. Exhibits to be products of the current year or for Hays & Grains can be 2021. Exhibits must meet qualifications or be disqualified.

2. **All exhibitors must be of an amateur status.**
3. The Committee has the authority to remove all soiled, defaced or old work and instruct the Judge to award the prize to new and up to date work. The Judge and Committee have the right to change an exhibit into another class if they feel it is more appropriate.
4. All point totals calculated as 1st-3 points; 2nd -2 points; 3rd-1 point.
5. Additional rules may precede each section.

THROUGHOUT THE LISTS YOU WILL SEE SEVERAL CLASSES ENTITLED "OAAS COMPETITION". These are special competitions offered by the "Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies". Exhibitors enter in their local Fair - from there the winners will compete at the District Level - and from there compete at the annual Convention at the OAAS level in February 2023. The rules of the OAAS competition must be followed in order to qualify.

SECTION 33 – FLOWERS & PLANTS

1. All horticultural entries must be grown by the home gardeners EXCEPT for designs, where plant material (i.e., foliage as well as flowers) may come from any source. Should be in water & oasis to retain moisture.
2. Buds showing colour are considered a bloom.
3. No additional foliage is allowed in cut flowers category.
4. Containers: Use discretion about size, i.e., not overly large. Be sure containers for cut flowers are stable – not easily tipped.
5. Conditioning Technique: Use a sharp knife, cut flower stems on a diagonal to encourage upward flow of water. Hammer ends of woody materials so water may be absorbed easily. Char 2" at stem end of plants with milk sap (clematis, poppies, milkweed, etc.). This seals juices in but allows water to rest. Deadhead spent blooms and remove any dead leaves from your entry. Ideally, cut flowers in early morning and stand them immediately in a bucket of tepid water for a few hours or overnight in a cool place. If floral foam (oasis) is used be sure to drop it in a large container of lukewarm water. In one minute, the floral foam will be soaked.
6. Judging will be according to Ontario Judging Exhibiting Standards 2003.

2. Entry tags must be completed in full and be pinned or stapled (**no tape**) to every entry.
3. No commercial mixes of any kind are to be used unless otherwise stated. No other ingredient is to be added, unless stated, e.g., if asked for nuts, use only the nuts specified; if asked for chocolate chips, use only chocolate chips. No extras.
4. Please read all rules carefully to avoid being disqualified.
