The West Niagara Agricultural Society (WNAS) was formed in 2012 through the amalgamation of the former Lincoln Agricultural Society (LAS) and Smithville Agricultural Society (SAS). These non-profit organizations had each operated for over 150 years in the Lincoln and West Lincoln communities. After the sale of land owned by LAS in downtown Beamsville, it was decided that joining the two societies at a new central, rural location in Grassie (West Lincoln) with a new facility, would create a stronger organization. On a 95 acre parcel of land at the corner of Mud Street and Grimsby Mountain Road, the new West Niagara Agricultural Centre and Fairgrounds opened its doors in 2015 and has been going strong ever since.

WNAS is composed of members, and governed by a Board of Directors, all of who are VOLUNTEERS and who live in the surrounding communities coming from all walks of life.

ENTRY INFORMATION

Read through this prize book and decide what you would like to enter – there are so many choices! Be sure to read all the rules, both the general rules and the special rules for the category you have chosen.

To enter your finished creations, you must register online via our website: www.westniagarafair.ca or in-person at our office.

Entry tags will be available for pick-up at the Fair office beginning Monday, August 18th, 2025. Entries must be **registered prior to pick-up**. Please allow 24 hours minimum for processing and printing of tags.

DEADLINE for entry registration is NOON on Tuesday, September 2nd, 2025. Entry tags registered on September 1st and 2nd, 2025 will be ready for pick-up from 4 to 7pm on Tuesday, September 2nd, 2025.

Please contact the office well ahead of time if you need help with online registration of entries. Call 905-309-9939 or e-mail homecraft@westniagaraagsociety.ca and we will be happy to help!

All entries must be brought to the West Niagara Fairgrounds on Wednesday, September 3rd, 2025 between 12 and 8pm. Late submissions will not be accepted under any circumstances. Entry tags should be affixed to the entries ahead of time.

GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

Additional rules and or exceptions to rules may precede each section. Please read them carefully to avoid disqualification.

Exhibitor's Fees for 2025

- \$10 exhibitor fee for entry to adult classes
- \$5 exhibitor fee for entry to junior classes

All exhibitors (including livestock exhibitors) must pay the yearly exhibitor fee (excluding WNAS Members) in order to enter classes.

Exhibitors receive one free entry pass to the Fair as part of their fee. Exhibitors may enter as many classes as they like, with a maximum of one entry per class (unless otherwise noted).

Registering and Dropping Off Entries

Entries must be registered either online or in-person in accordance with instructions given. See previous page for detailed instructions.

Picking Up Entries

All entries must be picked up on the Sunday of the Fair between 5 and 7pm. (Gate admission is waived beginning at 5pm.) Please present your Claim Card at pick up. Unclaimed entries will be discarded.

Entry Fees

In lieu of entry fees, 10% will be deducted from all prize winnings (unless stated otherwise).

Prize Money

All exhibitors (except for Junior Fair) winning a total of \$15.00 or more in prize money will have the following year's exhibitor fee retained from this year's winnings.

Prize money (except for Junior Fair) will be paid by cheque and mailed within 60 days of the close of the Fair.

Junior Fair prize money will be paid out in cash on the Sunday of the Fair between 5 and 7pm, during entry pick up.

In the case of bad weather or unfavourable circumstances resulting in poor attendance or cancellation of events, WNAS reserves the right to pay out only a portion of stated prize money.

Judging

NO EXHIBITOR OR COMMITTEE MEMBER SHALL INTERFERE WITH THE JUDGES OR JUDGING PROCESS IN ANY WAY. Disrespect of any kind will not be tolerated. The decision of the judge shall be final in all cases.

Judges are requested not to award prizes to animals or articles that they consider unworthy. Should there be only one entry in a class, the judge may use their discretion as to award an appropriate placing.

Violation of Rules

WNAS reserves the right to retain the exhibitor fees and prize money of any exhibitor who violates any of the rules contained in this prize book, and may move to bar such exhibitor from future entry at WNF.

CLASS 826 - ANGEL FOOD CAKE - RECIPE

Ingredients:

- 1 cup cake flour
- 1-1/2 cups sugar, divided in half
- 12 large egg whites only, room temperature
- 1-1/2 tsp cream of tartar
- 1/4 tsp table salt
- 1-1/2 tsp vanilla extract
- 1-1/2 tsp almond extract, must have

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 375F. Sift cake flour and 3/4 cup sugar into a bowl and set aside.

Using stand mixer or electric hand mixer on mediumhigh speed, beat egg whites, cream of tartar, and salt until it forms soft peaks. Add the other 3/4 cup sugar slowly, and then beat on high until stiff peaks form.

Beating on LOW, add in flour mixture and both extracts slowly, stopping as soon as batter is incorporated. Do not over-mix. Using rubber spatula, fold in the sides and bottoms of bowl, to fully incorporate.

Spoon batter into UN-greased angel food cake pan. Do NOT grease the 2-piece angel food cake pan. Gently shake to even out batter.

Bake 30-35 min, or until the top springs back with a gentle touch, and top is golden.

Invert pan upside down, to cool completely. Run a thin knife around pan sides, and remove bottom from the sides. Gently cut bottom away from pan.

CLASS 827 - 12 YOLK POUND CAKE - RECIPE

Ingredients:

- 12 egg yolks
- 3 cups flour (preferably all purpose)
- 2-1/2 tsp baking powder
- a pinch of salt
- 2 cups granulated sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 tsp lemon extract
- 1 cup cold water

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 350F. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together.

Using a stand mixer or electric hand mixer on high, beat egg yolks until very fluffy and thick. Slowly add sugar and beat for 2 minutes at highest speed.

Reduce the speed and add vanilla, lemon and water.

Add flour and combine with whisk.

Pour into greased 12-cup bundt or tube pan.

Bake for 50-60 minutes, until a toothpick comes out clean.

Allow to cool for at least 15 minutes on a wire rack before removing it from the pan.

 where the district is unable to send the 1st place winner to the convention, then the 2nd place winner is
 eligible to enter.
- 2. Judges who officiate the Competition at the Annual Convention will be appointed by the OAAS.
- All entries must be received for judging by the Competition Committee in the designated area by 5pm on the Thursday afternoon of the Annual Convention of the OAAS. Please retain the ticket issued, to claim the entry when the viewing rooms close.
- A number is assigned to each entry. Entries are only identified by this number during the judging process.
- Please remove all tags, ribbons, or any other fair/exhibition identification from the entries.
- No persons other than the judges and designated officials will be permitted to enter the designated judging room until after the judging and winners have been announced.
- Any exhibitor or any person acting on behalf of the exhibitor who violates any of the Rules and Regulations or who interferes with the judges or the judging process, shall be disqualified and the entry will be removed from the competition.
- No entry may be removed from the display area until the official closing of the viewing room and designated time of pick up.
- The OAAS shall not be held liable for any loss occasioned by fire, theft, accident or the negligence of other exhibitors, officials or otherwise.
- Any protests must be made to the Competition Committee of the OAAS in writing within 5 working days after the last day of the convention.

- The quilt must be solely made, and machine quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eliqible for this competition.
- Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches. Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All 4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.
- 4. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.
- The winning OAAS Machine Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.
- 6. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules.
- The use of domestic, mid arm and/or long arm equipment is permitted on hand or computer guided machine quilt entries.

District Competition

- Each local fair is entitled to send their best of show of all eligible machine quilts to the district competition.
- 2. If the fair's best of show machine quilt classes has won at more than one fair, the exhibitor must consider their own agricultural society as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the district meeting, otherwise it should be sent from the agricultural society nearest his/her home address. The other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, may enter their second best of show machine quilt in the district competition.
- An exhibitor who wins more than one best of show title with different machine quilts at different fairs is entitled to enter each winning quilt in the district competition.
- If an exhibitor is exhibiting in more than one district, they are entitled to enter different winning quilts at different district competitions but cannot enter the same quilt at more than one district competition.
- The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning machine guilts at each district competition.
- A photo of the top three placed machine quilts at the district competition must accompany the "OAAS Championship Quilt Entry Form"

Provincial Competition

- 7. All quilts entered in the competition must be machine quilted.
- 8. A \$500.00 GRAND PRIZE and rosette will be awarded. The exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.
- 9. A \$100 RESERVE GRAND PRIZE will be awarded. The exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.
